## A MESSAGE FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

June 25 proved to be an interesting day. I attended a wonderful memorial service at Israel AME for the victims of Charelston. It was organized by Rev. Ed Smart, Rev. Mick Drown, and Rev. Patrick Avery and led by Rev. McKinley Johnson. The music, the sentiments as delivered by Rabbi Beverly Magidson from the Jewish community, Dr. Khalid Bhatti from the Muslim community, and Bala from the Hindu community all had the same theme at its core—peace and unity. And outside the door of the church--a police car parked to insure that peace.

Two hours later I was at the Islamic Center of the Capital District to be part of an interfaith "iftar." Iftar is a call to prayer and meal to end the daily Ramadan fast. The Islamic Center has been offering this opportunity to share during Ramadan for longer than I can remember. This year it was packed with area Christians of every stripe, Jews, Hindus, and Buddhists. It was a marvelous evening and at the center of the prayers and remarks, the theme of—peace and unity. Hmmmm. Outside the door of the mosque, a police car

parked to insure our evening of peace—yet again. People at prayer. People in community. People linked together with a common thread to God. For sure the differences of religious tradition is the plan of God. The challenge of all of us is to connect and respond with dignity and respect—truly Amazing Grace!

## KIDS LUNCHBOX Interfaith Initiative



We are off and running....no not the Saratoga Race Track but our Kids Lunchbox—free lunches for children in the West Hill/Arbor Hill area. This

interfaith initiative to feed kids in our city will run Tuesdays and Thursdays from July 7 through August 20. The Council is grateful for those who have come forward to help hand out lunches in the neighborhoods.

We have representatives from the Christian community including the Bruderhof community, Mus-lim, Jewish, and Hindu communities. All who know the importance of meeting the challenges of child hunger.

Statistics show that 11,000 children in Albany are eligible for summer lunch with only 2,000 receiving it. The Kids Lunchbox is designed to boost those numbers this summer. Identifying neighborhood need is on-going.
