#### **CACC** Overflow Shelter ready for another season

The Overflow Shelter opened on November 1<sup>st</sup>, and will be open through April 30<sup>th</sup>, 2020. Shelter Director Pam Bullock expects that most of the 19 beds will be full for most of the season. This will be the third season the Overflow Shelter is working with Albany County Department of Social Services to accept referrals for housing men who are in need of a place to spend a night or perhaps more during the winter months. As well as other referrals from Travelers Aid, Homeless Action Committee and those who might walk-in.

Over the summer of 2019 Overflow Shelter Committee Chair Dave Stagliano recruited some youth to spruce up the Shelter lounge and bathroom areas. The lounge and bathroom were given a fresh coat of paint as well as a new vinyl tile floor in the lounge. Several new pieces of furniture, a sofa and chair, t.v. stand and side table were added, to replace the old sofa/chair which had met their end of use.

As in the past Volunteers are a big part of the continuing success of the Shelter operation. This year we are again asking for Volunteers from 6-9 pm each night to assist in the setup and serving of meals and some other light housekeeping. Meals are provided by many faith communities for the guests nightly and are mostly accounted for.

### John U. Miller Memorial CROP Hunger Walk Raises \$96,000!

Over 250 walkers and volunteers showed up on a rainy Sunday in May to participate in the John U. Miller Memorial CROP Hunger Walk in Albany. Two of Rev. Miller's daughters and a granddaughter came from the Boston area to walk with us. Rev. Miller served as Executive Director of CACC from 2000-2010 and was proud that the Albany CROP Hunger Walk consistently placed among the top 10 CROP Walks in the nation in terms of the amount of money raised. This year will be no exception, since by June 30 (the end of the walk fiscal year), \$96,022 had been turned in.

One quarter of the money raised has come back to CACC and was distributed among 26 different food programs in our service area. The remainder was used by

Church World Service and its partners for global hunger relief and development, including access to clean water.

### **AFFORDABLE HOUSING IN THE CAPITAL REGION**

The Capital Area – especially its cities - has a serious shortage of housing that is affordable for people with limited income. People with "limited income" who need affordable housing doesn't refer just to the economically poorest, but also people who work in full-time jobs for low wages. While federal guidelines define "affordable" as housing that costs 30% or less of a person's monthly income, in the Capital Region, thousands of people of limited income are paying 50% or more of their income in rent. This heavy rent-burden has become a leading cause of family homelessness.

The good news is that there has been recent progress on the State and local governmental levels in the areas of tenants' rights and affordable housing. However, much more work needs to be done. In partnership with others, the faith communities can play a pivotal role in helping provide decent, affordable housing in our area.

Congregations who are interested in getting involved, might consider:

- Joining affordable housing advocacy organizations, such as the Housing for All Coalition.
- Supporting local housing organizations, such as the Affordable Housing Coalition, Land Trust, Community Loan Fund, Habitat for Humanity, etc., so they can better support existing low-income home owners.
- Supporting local churches that are already doing housing development in their neighborhoods, and/or deciding, as a church, to directly develop affordable housing.
