### President's report

To my Dear Brothers and Sisters in Jesus Christ,

Jesus says, "Come to me all you who are weary and burdened, and I will give you rest. Take my yoke upon you and learn from me, for I am gentle and humble in heart, and you will find rest for your souls. For my yoke is easy and my burden is light." ~ Matthew 11:28-30 (NIV)

My parents went through a long and bitter divorce. Though my parents fed and clothed me, other needs were neglected. Church was a space where I found hope, healing, and freedom from the wearying "hero child" role that I had at home. I could be "Pete," a socially awkward kid that liked to drink tea and was a member of the Bible Quizzing team. Through the scriptures, Bible Quizzing taught me about Jesus, the competitions at other churches inspired my interest in ecumenism and becoming team captain was one of my first church leadership opportunities.

Jesus went through all the towns and villages, teaching in their synagogues, preaching the good news of the kingdom and healing every disease and sickness. When he saw the crowds, he had compassion on them, because they were harassed and helpless, like sheep without a shepherd. Then he said to his disciples, "The harvest is plentiful but the workers are few. Ask the Lord of the harvest, therefore, to send out workers into his harvest field." ~ Matthew 9:35-38 (NIV)

I have come to appreciate that running a church is hard work. It's easy to get lost in the details of the issue of the day, committee meetings, budgets, building repairs, events, and e-mails. Creating healing spaces for our communities or trying new programs takes diligence. Sometimes it falls flat like in the Parable of the Sower (Matthew 13), when the seeds fall on the path, the thorns, or the rocks. But when the seed falls on good soil, when we create a space or program that succeeds, it produces "a crop - a hundred, sixty or thirty times what was sown." I am thankful for our pastors, leaders, volunteers, and community members who diligently sow seeds. God only knows where I, and many others, would be today without meeting Jesus through church. Today, like 2000 years ago, "the harvest is plentiful but the workers are few."

"My prayer is not for them alone. I pray also for those who will believe in me through their message, that all of them may be one, Father, just as you are in me and I am in you. May they also be in us so that the world may believe that you have sent me. I have given them the glory that you gave me, that they may be one as we are one: I in them and you in me. May they be brought to complete unity to let the world know that you sent me and have loved them even as you have loved me."  $\sim John 17:20-23$ 

As a network of over 90 churches, we can do more together than we can each do alone. Towards this end, CACC has adopted a Strategic Plan that prioritizes building stronger relationships with and between our member churches. One method of relationship building will be the Ecumenical Liaison program where member churches can identify a liaison from their church to network with CACC and liaisons from other churches. A challenge one church faces today is a challenge that another church may have overcome yesterday. Today's successes at one church could lend heart and inspiration to another. Jesus prayed that we all may be one, and that unity can only be built if we meet, respect, and share with one another.

Three years ago, I identified that CACC needed to focus on three areas. Recruiting quality Board members, rebuilding committees, and engaging with our member churches. The progress that was reported last year has continued. In addition to Dr. Richard Pfau and Dr. Margaret Anderton, who were voted in as board members at our Assembly last year, Anel Smith of Macedonia Baptist Church was recruited, and the Board of Directors voted him to the board. As per our by-laws, Anel will be confirmed at this year's assembly. All three have proven to be excellent additions to CACC. There are now fully functioning Communications and Finance Committees and the start of a Development Committee. Less was accomplished with engaging churches in 2023 than I had hoped. That effort will resume full force in March.

You will note from this year's Annual Report that all our programs are still thriving. The CROP Walk raised over \$100,000 and the MLK Scholarship over \$14,000. The Emergency Homeless Overflow Shelter continues to serve men over 18 years old during the winter months. In addition to the MLK Interfaith Celebration in January and our Good Friday service in April, an ecumenical dementia-friendly service was held in September. A video of the service and a panel discussion around the planning are available on the CACC YouTube channel. Finally, in June, we held our first ecumenical summer kick-off picnic at Henry Hudson Park in Selkirk.

In June, CACC prepared a grant request to the Lilly Endowment for their Thriving Congregations grants. Though we were not awarded a grant, creating the submission helped the CACC board realize there was a role that we could play in helping our congregations to thrive. Though some denominations have been shrinking for years, COVID-19 was particularly harmful to many churches and there are congregations that have not recovered to prepandemic levels. This provides an opportunity for CACC to live its motto to "do together what we cannot do alone." CACC will seek out resources and best practices around re-building congregations and discipleship. These resources will be shared among our member churches as will success stories. CACC will help churches either develop a program or training, assist in identifying a group of churches that will work together, or at times, CACC will provide the program or training. By working together, we can provide opportunities for the Capital Region to hear and respond to the good news of Jesus Christ. A key piece of this initiative is the Ecumenical Liaison program CACC is launching, and which Board President Peter Crasto-Donnelly speaks to in his report.

### The John U. Miller Memorial CROP Hunger Walk in Albany

Despite lingering concerns over COVID-19, over 150 people signed in at First Lutheran Church on Sunday, May 7th to participate in the John U. Miller Memorial CROP Hunger Walk in Albany. An equal number walked with congregational groups in other places (e.g. the Crossings, various parks, and the Albany County Rail Trail) and on other days during the month of May. Providing options for "satellite walks" is a successful strategy and will be continued for the 2024 Walk.

Will Vail and Phil Teumin, the "Delmariners", once more entertained the walkers prior to the opening ceremonies where Honorary Chair Jill Szwed, News Channel 10 Morning Meteorologist, and Walk Chair Kitt Jackson both spoke. Two of Rev. Miller's daughters came from the Boston area to walk with us. (Rev. Miller served as Executive Director of CACC from 2000-2010 and was very proud that the Albany CROP Hunger Walk consistently placed among the top 10 CROP Walks in the U.S. in terms of the amount of money raised.) The 2023 Walk was number 6 in the nation, raising a total of \$102, 612.

One quarter of the money raised, over \$26,065, came back to CACC and was distributed among 26 different feeding programs in our service area. The remainder was used by Church World Service and its partners for global hunger relief and development, including improving access to clean water and providing assistance to refugees from Ukraine.

Planning is underway for the May 5, 2024 Walk. It will have a new location—starting and ending at St. Paul's Episcopal Church on Hackett Blvd. Call the CACC office at (518)462-5450 to learn how you can be involved. The CROP Walk Committee usually meets on the second Wednesday of each month, from 4:00-5:30pm, at First Lutheran Church in Albany. New members are welcome and needed. CACC and those in the Ecumenical Witnesses of Baptism program were saddened by the passing of Miranda Rand, Coordinator for CACC's Ecumenical Witnesses of Baptism, on March 31, 2023. Her death created a hole in the program which was still recovering from the COVID-19 pandemic. Executive Director Bruce France began evaluating how best to replace Miranda in addition to becoming the point person for EWB requests.

After lengthy consideration and reviewing the history of the program, replacing the single coordinator position with a committee made the most sense. A committee allows more people to be involved, spreads out the work, and provides backup if someone is unable to be active. The committee (names and duties outlined below) began meeting in the summer and immediately began holding discussions about redoing the brochure and planning for the 2024 renewal service.

Along with establishing the committee, the EWB program proceeded as usual. Approximately 20 people gathered on January 8, 2023, at First Church in Albany for the 28th EWB renewal service. The service was led by Rev. Trey Tirpak of First Church in Albany. Changes in leadership resulted in poor record keeping. Around twenty baptisms were witnessed at several different churches.

The 51st Annual Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. Interfaith Celebration was held, as usual, on Dr. King's birthday. This year, the day was Sunday, January 15, 2023, and the service was hosted by the Macedonia Baptist Church, led by Rev. Michael-Aaron Poindexter, M.Div., Pastor. Over 100 people attended the service. Rev. Jahmel K. Robinson, Pastor, Mount Zion Baptist Church, was the riveting Keynote Speaker. Pastor Robinson was introduced by Rev. Constance Knight, Moderator of the Hudson River Missionary Baptist Association. Ms. Nell Stokes and Mrs. Ann Pope provided their stories concerning civil rights. The invocation was provided by Rabbi Beverly Magidson, Capital District Board of Rabbis & Cantors, and Rev. James Kane Director, The Commission for Ecumenical and Interreligious Affairs, RCDA gave the Benediction. Elder Andrea Ralph, MLK Committee Co-chair presided over the celebration and MLK Committee Co-chair Rev. Antonio Booth made closing remarks. Words of Dr. King were read by Kairen Eric Russell of the Buddhist Tradition, Khalafalla Osman Islamic Tradition, Scholarship recipients Nyasha Jones and Samantha Ivey, and Junii Middleton, Orville Ivey and Sanai West. We also worked on an agenda of tasks and projects, many of which will continue to be pursued in 2024. These include:

- a) Engaging a consultant to conduct an audit review of the Council's financials and internal controls;
- b) Documenting the Council's relationship with our ministries;
- c) Conducting a review of the Council's insurance policies;
- d) Supporting the discussion about the future location of the Council and Overflow Shelter;
- e) Preparing 2024 budgets for operations and the Shelter.

We are also pleased to support the new Development initiative being led by Richard Pfau.

The December 2023 balance sheet (next page) shows beginning and end of year balances for all the Council's accounts. Also provided is a budget document for core Council operations showing actual income and expenses for the past four years together with a revenue and spending plan for 2024. I will offer some observations about the budget in my presentation at the annual meeting. In a nutshell, we continue to rely on contributions from congregations, individuals, and judicatories for administrative personnel and outreach. Our endowment funds grew this past year following losses during the pandemic; we have not tapped this resource for several years and plan to begin harvesting dividends for operations in 2024.

I am grateful for the other volunteer members of the Finance Committee who represent a diverse profile of perspectives and experience: Roxanne Jones Booth, Reinaldo Cardona, Barbara Croskery, Bruce France, Richard Pfau, and Anel Smith.

For the first 2 months {Nov-Dec} of the 2023-24 Overflow Shelter being open, have averaged 12-14 guests each evening with the weekends having the most each night (up to 16). A few nights we have been at full capacity of 19.

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{a total of 353 nights for Nov.; 353/30 = \sim 12 \text{ guests}/\text{nt average}} {for Dec., 427 nights = 14/nt average} for Jan. 2024 have been averaging 14/nt. as of Jan. 8. [Between Feb. – Apr. 2023, Shelter numbers totaled 1,242 total guests for avg. of 14/nt.]
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As we get into the colder winter months of 2024 and our numbers increase, we may need to increase overnight staff to 2 people from 1, in order to assure safety and backup should an emergency arise w/ the guests. {to be determined, based on staff available}

Pam is contacting them, we have until July 2024 to use any of these funds. {we already have on hand much cleaning supplies and other things that have been donated by our faith communities}

We will also have received another order of BOMBAS calf high socks for distribution to our guests.

### **Board Development:**

The committee reviewed a board member matrix that identified board demographics in areas regarding age, gender, ethnicity, geography, denomination, areas of expertise and circles of influence. All board members responded which gave us an accurate snapshot of the current board.

The results suggest that we need to broaden the overall representation on the board primarily in the areas of age, ethnicity, denomination and areas of influence. Board members have received some preliminary resources which have led to some strategies for improving the composition of the board which we hope will bring in additional opinions, worship styles and organizational models to provide a broader perspective in CACC programing and events.

The Governance committee will provide materials and training to help board members and committee chairs accomplish the strategies and tactics laid out in the Capital Area Council of Churches Strategic Plan. This plan was developed over the past few years and finalized into a working document at the Strategic Planning Meeting of August 12, 2023.
