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Meet our New Executive Director, Peter Crasto-Donnelly



Dear Friends,

It is an honor and a privilege to be called to serve as the Executive Director of the Capital Area Council of Churches. First—I want to express my gratitude to Bruce France—both for his five years of service as Executive Director and for his ongoing support to ensure a smooth transition.

Ecumenism is a passion that God laid on my heart from a young age as my faith formation is ecumenical in nature. I was born and raised as a Roman Catholic through Elementary School. I spent middle and high school attending a Free Methodist Church where Free Methodist Bible Quizzing played a key role in helping me learn and understand this faith through the Bible. While attending Union College, I joined InterVarsity Christian Fellowship where I gained friends from many different Christian Traditions. I also used my Sophomore Research as an opportunity to compare the role of the Deacon across Roman Catholic, Presbyterian, and Free Methodist traditions, and used my Senior Thesis to explore ecumenical partnerships. It was at Union that I met my wife, Teresa. After college, I moved to Albany and came full circle by completing my First Communion and joining Teresa's Roman Catholic Church, The Shrine Church of Our Lady of the Americas where I serve as Trustee.

Since graduating college I have been seeking an ecumenical position and am grateful for God's preparation of me over the past decade. Following college I served at the Rescue Mission of Utica for four years overseeing the Food Pantry and the Clothing Closet. This service was Ecumenical in nature as Christians from many traditions worked and volunteered in service to the poor. After this I served for six years at The Food Pantries for the Capital District, a coalition of over 70 food pantries, where my last role was as Program Director. I am grateful that God led me to be mentored by Angie Pender-Fox who always kept the needs of our neighbors and the feedback from our members front and center to every decision and program. I strive to do the same here at CACC where I have served on the board for the past five years, the last two as Board President.

A final note, during the most challenging parts of my life, God led me to church families that enveloped me in love and affirmation. Without meeting God through the church, I would not be where I am today. I am passionate about seeing churches succeed and grow so that others can both meet God and find their place in the body of Christ. I look forward to meeting our member churches and seeing how we can work together to love our God and love our neighbor together.



Established in 1642, The First Church, a member of the Reformed Church in America, is a nationally historic congregation and one of the oldest churches in the United States. Celebrating history with the ethos of First Church, Sunday services are classical with hymns, prayers, and sermons, but progressive as the church professes liberating theology and contemporary values. Its mission statement reflects on the importance of welcoming peoples of all backgrounds.

"In response to God's unconditional love for all people made known to us in Jesus Christ, we are called to be a welcoming and affirming community. The First Church in Albany includes young and old, families, couples and singles, rich and poor, persons of various races, ethnicities, backgrounds, sexual orientation and gender identities, differing physical and mental abilities, believers and seekers. come into the full life of the church all those whom God sends us. Centered in Christ, we commit ourselves to breaking down dividing walls and building a community where we are all loved. ""

In addition to classical Sunday services, newcomers are also invited to attend the more informal, contemporary service in the Stephen James Chapel on Sundays at 9 AM. This service is relaxed and interactive and everyone is welcome for fellowship and worship.

Note: As a member of RCA, First Church, in addition to supporting local and worldwide mission programs, participates in many ecumenical initiatives such as Church World Service and the National Council of Churches, offering its members opportunities for active service both near and far.

A long-time supporter of CACC, First Church has hosted several CACC events. In January of 2023, the Ecumenical Witnesses of Baptism Renewal Service was held in their chapel and the service was led by Associate Minister The Rev. Trey Tirpak. This January, First Church hosted the Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Interfaith Celebration with Senior Pastor The Rev. Dr. Mashona Walston delivering the celebration message.

PRAYER NOTES

Praying with Scripture

Lectio Divina and Gospel Contemplation are two ways to pray with Scripture.

This month we'll look at Lectio Divina, or Holy Reading: Lectio Divina

This method of prayer goes back to the early monastic tradition. There were not bibles for everyone and not everyone knew how to read. So the monks gathered in chapel to hear a member of the community reading from the scripture. In this exercise they were taught and encouraged to listen with their hearts because it was the Word of God that they were hearing.

When a person wants to use *Lectio Divina* as a prayer form today, the method is very simple. When one is a beginner, it is better to choose a passage from one of the Gospels or epistles, usually ten or fifteen verses. Some people who regularly engage in this method of prayer choose their reading from the day's lectionary.

First, go to a quiet place, settle in and remind yourself that you are about to listen to the Word of God with God.

Next, read the scripture passage aloud so that you hear the words with both body and mind.

When you have finished reading the passage out loud, pause for a moment and recall if any word or phrase stood out or touched your heart in some way while you were reading. Savor the insight, feeling, or question that arose.

Go back and read the passage out loud again. Once again, pause and note what happened within you.

If you want to talk with God in response to what you felt, follow the promptings of your heart.

This reflective listening allows the Holy Spirit to deepen your awareness of God's desire to speak with you.



MAY ALL BE ONE


Every year, Christian communities and churches join together to pray for the visible unity of the Church, faithfully abiding by the will of Christ, who prayed "that all may be one" (John 17:21), during the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity. In much of the world, this Week of Prayer is commemorated from January 18-25. In other places, it is celebrated during the eight days preceding Pentecost. The Franciscan Friars and Sisters of the Atonement of Graymoor in Garrison, NY, USA, feel called to invite all Christians to the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity 2025.

The Week of Prayer for Christian Unity, which was co-founded at Graymoor in 1908 and continues today to realign the hearts of Christians toward mutual recognition and spiritual transformation. This year's theme is "Do you believe?"

A local Ecumenical Celebration of the Word of God will be hosted by the Roman Catholic Diocese of Albany's Commission on Ecumenical and Inter-Religious Affairs on Wednesday January 22nd at 12:15 PM at the RCDA Pastoral Center - 40 N Main Ave, Albany, NY 12203. This year the 10th Bishop of the Episcopal Diocese of Albany will preach and Peter Crasto-Donnelly will preside at the service.

Jesus Prays for All Believers - John 17: 20-23

My prayer is not for them alone. I pray also for those who will believe in me through their message, <u>21</u>that all of them may be one, Father, just as you are in me and I am in you. May they also be in us so that the world may believe that you have sent me. I have given them the glory that you gave me, that they may be one as we are one— I in them and you in me—so that they may be brought to complete unity. Then the world will know that you sent me and have loved them even as you have loved me.



Faith Comes by Hearing - Improving Accessibility for those who are Hard of Hearing— Peter Crasto-Donnely

Inclusion and accessibility are key principles followed by All Saints Roman Catholic Church in Albany, NY. All Saints has continued to livestream masses as it allows distant family and friends to celebrate the sacraments with their loved ones and provides a connection to the church community for homebound parishioners. Through a grant from the Roman Catholic Diocese of Albany, All Saints was able to make accessibility improvements to their church, including installing automatic doors and purchasing Williams Sound Neckloop Telecoil Couplers for their congregants that are hard of hearing. The device is like a small radio that connects directly to the church's sound system. By plugging in a pair of headphones to the coupler congregants muffle out ambient noise and are able to clearly hear the service. Like a radio, congregants also have the ability to increase or lower the volume of the device.

Lori Herkenham, Chair of the Parish Council at All Saints, learned about the technology from other local churches including St. Vincent de Paul. All Saints staff or volunteers ensure that the couplers and headphones are placed on a front table before each service. Headphones are individually bagged. At the end of the service, congregants place the couplers back on the front table, and used headphones are placed in a basket under the table. Between services, staff or volunteers wipe down each pair of headphones and re-bag it for use.

Like all things new, it took about a month for congregants to learn how to use the technology, but once they did, the feedback was very positive. It turned out that there were congregants who had been coming to service each week even though they couldn't hear the service very well. Thankfully, at the recommendation of St. Vincent's, All Saints purchased a dozen couplers to ensure that they had enough.

The couplers were purchased and installed through Corvino and Sons.



Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. Scholarship 2025 Honoring Dr. King's Legacy

Once again the Capital Area Council of Churches will sponsor the 53rd Annual Martin Luther King Jr. Interfaith Scholarship Memorial Celebration on January 15, 2024 at Congregation Bethe Emeth on Academy Road. This Interfaith Celebration aims to remind of us of Dr. King's legacy as well as raise scholarship funds for deserving high school seniors. It will be an evening of prayer, song, and speakers who honor the accomplishments of Martin Luther King with words of wisdom and faith.

The MLK scholarship was established in 1973 by the Capital Area Council of Churches to honor the memory of the life and work of



Dr. King and to preserve the legacy of the nonviolent human rights movement as it was expressed in his life and teachings. Awards are given without regard to race, creed or gender. The scholarship is a very positive way of encouraging young people to keep striving for the fulfillment of Dr. King's dream. The MLK scholarship is available to graduating high school seniors who live, worship, or attend school in Albany County or southern Rensselaer County. The award is presented to a student(s) who demonstrates academic merit, financial need and, most importantly, the strength and determined character of the late Martin Luther King Jr. Many former recipients have let us know how the scholarship was an encouragement as they began their educational path.

This year, in celebration of fifty-three years of raising scholarships, we look to raise \$20,000 to support five children with their college education. Therefore, we look for your financial support again. We are asking various churches, temples, mosques, or synagogues to donate a minimum of \$200 towards the scholarship fund. If your religious institution can give more, please do so. If one hundred religious institutions support this cause, we will have reached our goal. Please support this worthy effort.

CROP Walk 2025

As we approach the end of 2024, the Albany CROP Walk Committee is already planning the 45th annual CROP Hunger Walk in Albany, now known as the John U Miller Memorial CROP Walk. We wanted you to be aware of the dates and locations of the 2025 CROP Recruiters Rally and the Walk. The Rally and Awards Reception has been tentatively scheduled for Sunday afternoon, March 23, at the First Church in Albany on No. Pearl St. (the same location as last year's Rally) More details will come to you in a mailing in February.

The Walk will take place on Sunday, May 4, at a new starting location and an hour later than in previous years. The Walk will begin and end at the **Church of St. Vincent de Paul, 900 Madison Ave**. in Albany, a location along the route that had been used for several years. **Registration** will begin at **1:30pm** in the fellowship space, with music and opening ceremonies in the sanctuary. The Walk will officially step off at 2:30pm. As in the past, there will be a choice of two routes: the Golden Mile and a longer loop of about 2.5 miles.
